

Kellogg Professorship VI in English



Nicole Pepinster Greene is an Associate Professor of English. She received a BA degree from University College in Dublin, Ireland and earned an MA from George Washington University and a PhD from LSU in English Literature. She has studied and taught in Europe and US. Dr. Greene began her academic career at Northern Virginia Community College; and before coming to Xavier University in August 2000, she taught at the University of Louisiana, Lafayette. Dr. Greene teaches courses in composition, world literature, science writing, English Literature and seminars on Irish Identity and Women and Work. She particularly enjoys introducing first-year students to poetry.

Dr. Greene has been Director of the English/English Education Program and Composition Director. She is beginning her first year as Chair of the Department of English and African American Studies. Editor of the *Journal of College Writing* 1997-2007 and now editor of *Xavier Review*, Dr. Greene also serves as Chair of Xavier Endowment for the Humanities. Her research, which focuses primarily on two areas: the pedagogy of basic writing and twentieth-century Irish writers and culture, has been published in *Modern Irish Writers*, *Multicultural Education*, *New Hibernia Review* and *Working Papers in Irish Studies*. Most recently, she is co-editor of *Basic Writing in America: A History of Nine College Programs* (Hampton Press, 2008). Dr. Greene is presently returning to her work on twentieth-century Irish writers, Edith Somerville and Martin Ross.
