# XULA in COSTA RICA







The XULA in COSTA RICA program, which took place over four weeks in June and was led by Professor Giti Farudi, was a success. A major focus of the program was giving students a chance to learn medical Spanish within an actual Spanish speaking healthcare environment, in order for them to acquire language skills that they can apply in their pre-medical studies and work in the US, where the gap between the increasing Spanish speaking population and the lack of Spanish speaking health care professionals has created a demand for more Spanish speaking health care professionals. Students improved their Spanish and gained valuable professional experience by taking Spanish 2051: Spanish for Medical Personnel and participating in several hours of medical observations, as well as shadowing physicians in Costa Rican clinics and hospitals.

Outside of their studies, students were fully immersed in the Spanish language and in Costa Rican culture. They lived with host families, and participated in several cultural activities and excursions: they explored the National Theatre, participated in a salsa dancing class, and went white water rafting. They also took weekend trips to the beaches of Guanacaste and Puerto Viejo, Limon.

# Xavier in Martinique











The four week Martinique program at the Université des Antilles was led by Dr. Susan Spillman, Associate Professor of French. The program was codirected and reinforced by native French Afro Antillaise professor, Dr. Myriam Moïse, Director of English Studies at the Universite des Antilles. Along with intensive language learning and conversational French, the studies also focused on Martinique's embedded Creolité (Afro Creole culture, history, and literature of Black Martinicans) as a major component and contribution to Martinique's contemporary culture and history.

In addition to coursework, students took several excursions including a guided walking tour of Fort de France, an excursion to Les ruines de Saint-Pierre, La Montagne Pelée, Le Jardin d'emeraude, Museum Aimé Césaire, Marché aux épices, and a boat shuttle to Trois ilets. Also, they met Victor Anicet, a Martinician artist and ceramist in his workshop and participated in Martinican cuisine workshop.

# Xavier in Cuba



The two programs that went to Cuba - directed by Dr. Karen Becnel Moore, retired Associate Professor of Spanish- were very different in that the first four week program was designed for advanced Spanish majors and minors who were both fluent and literate in Spanish and could enroll in a target language literature course entitled "Afro Hispanic Studies," focusing on the literature of Cuba, as well as an ALACS\*/AADS 3020 course: Special Topics in African American Studies entitled, "Afro Cuban Culture and History."

The second program was the inauguration of a unique innovative offering here at Xavier for incoming freshmen to have the opportunity to study abroad in the Caribbean in either a Spanish or French speaking country during their summer prior to entering Xavier. This past summer it was Cuba. All trips were thoroughly integrated with lectures, excursions, and cultural activities such as Salsa lessons and cooking lessons in Cuba.






