

Xavier University Professors Partner with New Orleans Area School teachers for GLOBE Workshops

New Orleans LA – In a cross-division collaboration, Xavier University of Louisiana Professors joined forces to train eighteen middle school teachers from across Orleans and Jefferson Parishes in GLOBE protocols.

Global Learning and Observations to Benefit the Environment (GLOBE) is an international science and education program that aims to provide students and the public around the world with the opportunity to take part in collecting data in an effort to get a better understanding of Earth's systems and the global environment. Each participant collaborated with Xavier Professors Dr. Morewell Gasseller (Department of Physics) and Dr. Timothy Glaude (Division of Education and Counseling) to complete investigations in surface temperature, atmospheric aerosols, soil and plant characterizations, as well as classroom activities aimed towards preparing students to fully grasp the information.

Presenters at the GLOBE workshop included Dr. Gasseller, Dr. Glaude, Xavier University of Louisiana sophomore Maryssa Bradley, and University of Southern Mississippi Ph.D. candidate Kendrick Buford.

"Partnering with local schools and organizations is one of our top priorities, and one of the reasons why Xavier continues to be a leader in STEM Education," said Dr. Anderson Sunda-Meya, Head of the Physics and Computer Science Department at Xavier. "It is our duty to educate and prepare the next generation of scientists."

At least 120 countries have participated in the GLOBE program, and there have been more than 150 million measurements contributed to the GLOBE database which creates meaningful, standardized, global research-quality data information that can be used for student and professional scientific research.
