How data is collected:

Data is collected via survey from baccalaureate degree candidates immediately prior to graduation. In the fall semester, data on educational outcomes is gathered from the National Student Clearinghouse, and via outreach by the Office of Career Services (OCS) graduates are invited to update their exit survey post-graduation status, though this is not required. Outcome information is also collected from campus community members and from web research.

Some graduates report more than one outcome; that is, continuing their education while also in employment. The numbers above are reflective of this. The percentage in employment only (i.e., those who are not continuing their education at this time) is 44.1% . Data was collected through December 31, 2024. Remaining graduates were either 1. Not seeking employment (including a number who indicated that they are taking a gap semester or gap year before entering an educational program), 2. Still seeking employment, or 3. No outcome was available.
